



# ST. ANDREW'S NEWS

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

The Pope's encyclical, *Laudato si: on care of our common home*, released to the world last month, gives us all much to ponder and pray about. In this bold letter to the world Francis decisively adds the strength of the Gospel to the world dialogue on the environment, where up until now only scientific, economic, and political voices have been engaged. Regardless about how one feels about climate change, it is undeniable that we are trashing our planet. We are using up precious natural resources without regard for future generations, and our wasteful practices have a disproportionate affect on the poor. Using many examples Francis points out that developing countries of the world are bearing the brunt of the shortsighted practices of governments and corporations. What underlies the harm that we are inflicting on the planet is what underlies the hatred and violence we inflict on one another - we live as if we are separate from one another and disconnected from all of God's creation. In Francis' words, "We lack an awareness of our common origin, of our mutual belonging, and of a future to be shared with everyone." The power that Francis' letter has for us is in reminding us that we are interwoven with God's Creation and not separate from it. Using the words of St. Francis' hymn "Canticle to Creation" to open his encyclical Francis reminds us "that our common home is like a sister with whom we share our life and a beautiful mother who opens her arms to embrace us." Yet, our actions are causing harm to our common home. The rapidly increasing culture of consumption is contributing to global deterioration. Though we were given charge by the Creator to "till and tend" Creation, we do far too much tilling, and very little tending.

Francis' plea, joined by many other faith leaders around the world, including our own Bishop Katharine, calls on the leaders of the nations to address this crisis both urgently and prayerfully. By sol-

idly grounding ecology with Biblical and church teachings, our faith leaders can lay a solid spiritual foundation for our response. At the General Convention I was impressed to see that, among several ecologically responsible practices, the event was entirely paperless; delegates and visitors followed the proceedings, including worship, using tablets and smartphones. Other actions of the Bishops and Deputies will help direct the Episcopal Church towards teaching and practice that is environmentally healing.

As I reflect on Francis' letter, I believe the first place to begin mending the disconnect between ourselves and God's Creation is through contemplative prayer. When we are more aware of the loving Christ within us, we can be more sensitive to God revealing, loving, and redeeming in Creation. This awareness and deep connection enable us to live in relation to God's world in ways that are more in tune with God's love for all Creation.

We are able to see with greater clarity that our purchases are not just economic decisions, but spiritual decisions as well. Personally, I am reflecting on how I can adjust my consumer habits to be more ecologically respectful.

Here at St. Andrew's I will engage the vestry and other leaders of the parish in discussions about steps we can take to more faithfully care for our environment. Our parish has already made many efforts in this direction, and parishioners regularly offer suggestions on how we can continue to be more ecologically responsible in our parish life.

As we continue to be aware of the God within us and reflect on our connection to all of God's Creation, I am confident that through Christ, with Christ and in Christ we will be able to effect a new ecological sensitivity and spirit to protect God's Creation, our common home.

## The St. Andrew's Children's Clinic

October 3-6, 2015, we will again journey to Hermosillo for our Annual Cleft Palate/Cleft Lip Mission. This is our 11th year of bringing life-changing surgery to children living in Mexico. Please help continue this Mission by sending a donation to fund all or part of a child's surgery.

Surgeries will be performed at CIMA Hospital by doctors from Children's Surgery International of Minneapolis. We will screen approximately 90 children for cleft lip and cleft palate surgery, with approximately 50-55 children receiving surgeries. CIMA Hospital volunteers and Clinic staff and volunteers coordinate activities and paperwork. Surgical expenses, lodging, hospital, and food are covered by The Clinic for the patients at no cost to the families. Their families cannot afford even a portion of these costs. Follow-up speech therapy for the children will be at St. Andrew's once-a-month clinic at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Nogales, Arizona or at CIMA Hospital in Hermosillo.


